- Creating a space for personal ties and voice in academic research (Reyes, 2021). **Future Directions**
- Institutions can implement more initiatives that promote diversity in academia.
- Museums include work from artists that showcase their identities.
- Helps promote a sense of personal and professional growth amongst higher education faculty members and staff.
