

The Portrayal of Women in Female-directed Bollywood Films

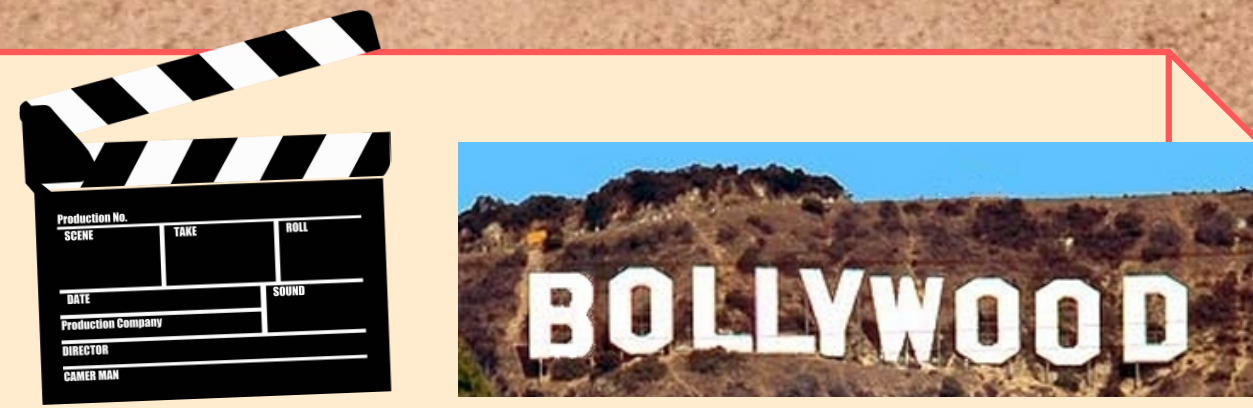


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Background



Bollywood films are a popular form of entertainment in India. Producers and directors are recognized all over the world and their films reach places other than India. Our research project analyzes the portrayal of women characters in female-directed Bollywood films. We take into account how Indian cultural contexts differ when analyzing the roles of women. The Bollywood film industry is predominantly patriarchal, male-dominated, and oftentimes views women in society through the male gaze. Many female characters in Bollywood films were created to fit into these paradigmatic social norms. We collected data through watching a series of films and completing surveys analyzing the films. While our results are not finalized, we have noticed patterns depending on the time the film was produced and where the film takes place.

Bewoofiyaan (2014) *A Death in the Gunj* (2016) *Raazi* (2018)

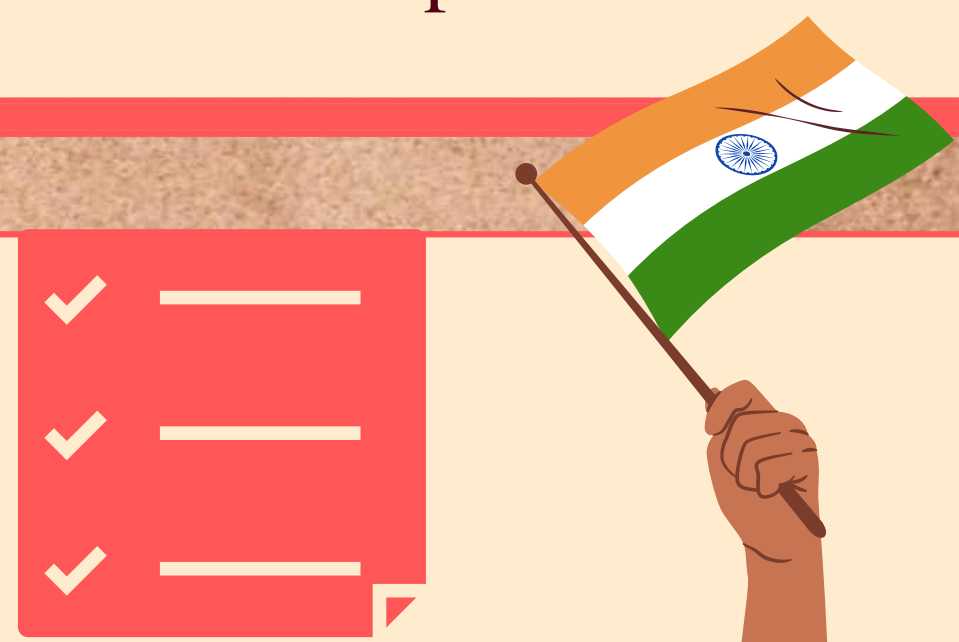
Discussion



Comparing the results to our hypothesis, we can see that women directors affect the representation of women in films. As the films were more recently made, the number of women in the films increased, as well as their exposure of skin, clothing, hair designs, personality towards confrontational situations, and their willingness to go against the usual societal standards and norms. This is extremely significant because women now are becoming leaders by being directors and changing the ways women are perceived to act in a patriarchal society.

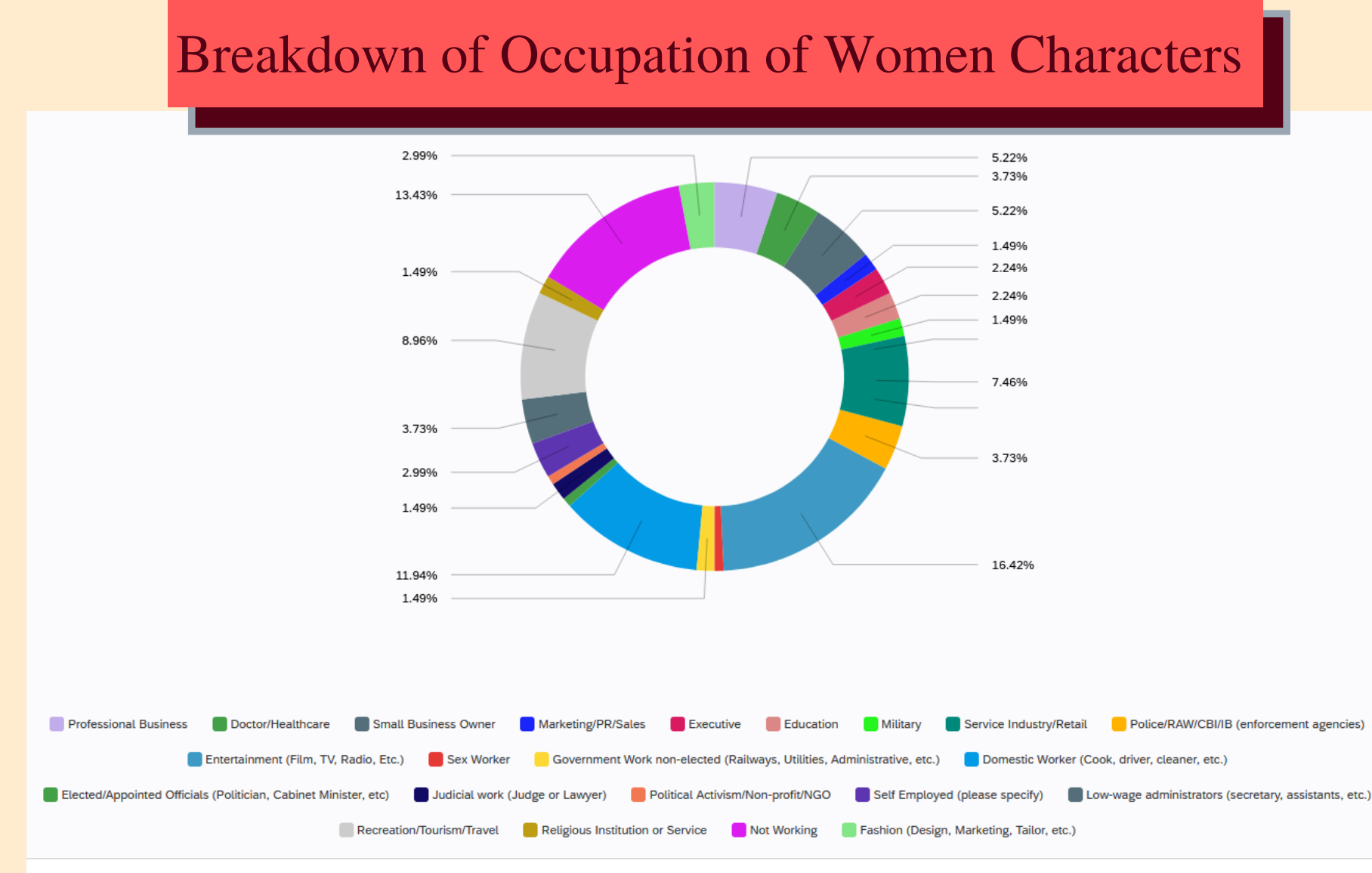

Qualitative data was collected through surveys and through objective questions. We are still in the preliminary stages so we do not have cohesive results at the moment. Methods



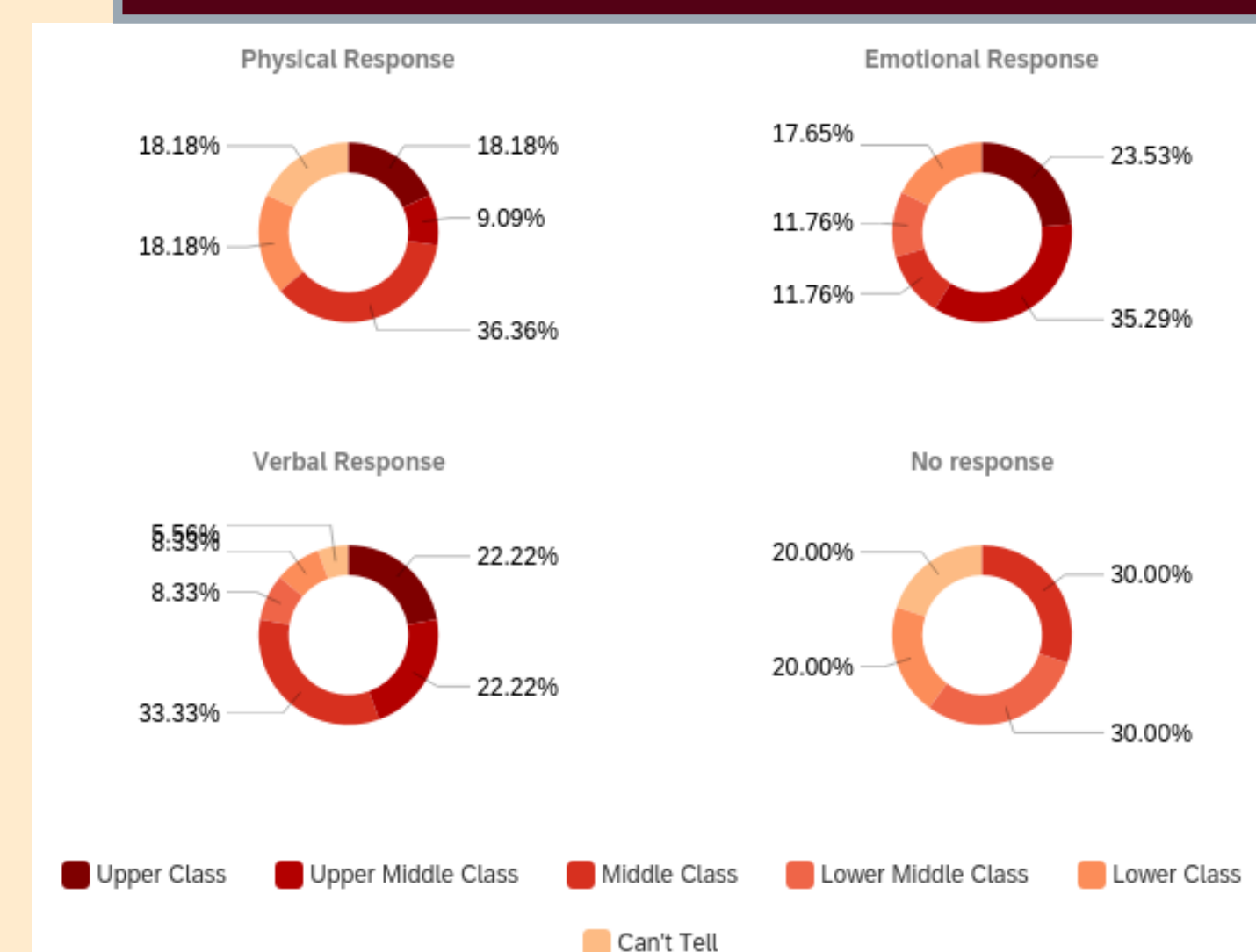
- We selected Hindi films directed by women.
- We watched and analysed these films.
- Used film coding to mark every time we saw specific qualities in the film (such as):
 - Women's attire
 - Women's accessories
 - Women's responses to social situations
 - Women's role in film
 - Women's relationships
- Collected all information in a Qualtrics survey.
- Compared survey results between researchers.
- Generated master list of survey results.

Confrontation According to Social Class



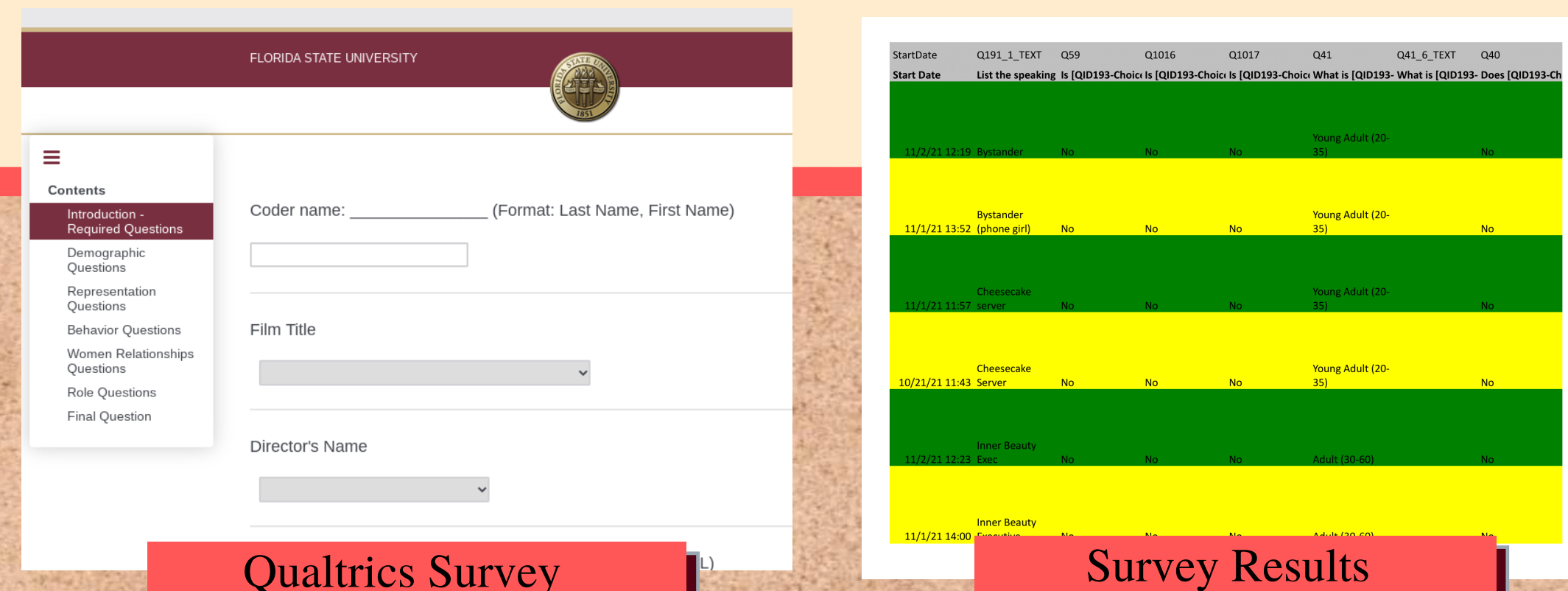
