The Chiricú journal and its publication "Citizens but Not Americans: Race and Belonging among Latino Millennials" described situations where racial politics have been visible and impacted the Latino's ability to immersive themselves. Latino millennials have described experiencing informal and formal policing of color lines through unequal access to resources and through surveillance, according to the study conducted.
