• I am originally from Brazil, and am interested in understanding how my country's complex history contributes to its social, political, and geographical dynamics today.


## Introduction

• **Zungus:** areas of living, religious practice, social connection, *capoeira*, and hiding during the times of slavery in Rio de Janeiro.

• **Cais do Valongo:** area of Rio de Janeiro where enslaved Africans were brought to Brazil, discovered through later archeological research. This area received an estimated 500,000 to 700,000 enslaved African people after their forced journey across the Atlantic.

#### **Results and Discussion**

• Afro-diasporic heritage has a long and complex history in the city of Rio de Janeiro.

• Despite the city's various cycles of urbanization and modernization and its Portuguese colonial structures, Rio's geographical **features** show the long-lasting impact of African diasporas from its 350 years of slavery.

• This evidence demonstrates the importance of these groups in the city's history, and their relevance in Brazilian culture, society,

identities, and daily dynamics. • I developed a more complete understanding of **Brazilian identity**, also contributing to my perception of my own ethnic and cultural connection to my home country.
