The way we would be collecting data is through interviews of African American students on campus. We expect that a lot of students will feel uncomfortable on campus but there are certain groups that they may be involved in that allow them to experience That sense of belongingness. Methods

We propose that this study will be performed utilizing a qualitative research approach. Open-ended question interviews will be taken of undergraduate Florida State University students who are members of the Black Student Union. We anticipate this approach will allow the researcher to delve into the true experiences of black students who will be allowed to open up and share their thoughts, feelings, and ideas about being black on this campus. The researcher hopes to understand the impact and importance of the Black Student Union in efforts to achieve, social, cultural, and academic success throughout one's college years. A qualitative study is best for this study because it will allow the researcher to gain a deeper, meaningful understanding of how students learn about these organizations, the need to have such organizations, as the black student union and focus on what the organizations due for the professional development of young, black collegiate students.





In the future, we'd suggest a longitudinal study with different types of tests done over time. With a longitudinal type of study, more evidence is collected over time which is more likely to be correct. Longitudinal studies also have stronger validity which allows researchers to have more accurate causal claims.
