Abstract



- Once I found that they were, I looked at why they felt they were discriminated against and found it related to how their culture was understood, then I would document it.








Figure shows discrimination of wages
















Conclusion/Discussion

Usually less than a quarter of the characters in Bollywood movies are female and they tend to be represented traditionally (Smith et al.). What these female-directed movies are showing is that more female characters are being included and they are not always strictly following what is considered "normal behavior" for women in India. This gives an indication that femaledirected movies in Bollywood do affect female representation in the movie. The women directors, however, are not focusing on women characters as their motive for making films; rather they want to make good films that are appreciated widely.
