

# Sound, Meaning and Music in Tolkien's Elvish Languages and in Le Guin's Invented Language Kesh



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
#### Introduction


- Our project examines sound-meaning connections ('sound symbolism') in two constructed languages ('conlangs')
- o J.R.R. Tolkien's Elvish language Sindarin (from The Lord of the Rings; Fig. 1)
- o Ursula K. Le Guin's post-apocalyptic *Kesh* (from *Always Coming Home*) (Fig. 2)
- Sound symbolism drives Tolkien's conlanging to a great extent (see for example Tolkien, Fimi & Higgins 2019; Farrugia 2019).
- Our project investigates the extent to which sound symbolism is present in Kesh
  Not investigated before.
- Sound symbolism is present in many languages (Hinton, Nichols & Ohala 1995; Blasi et al. 2016; Jao 2020, Winter & Perlman 2021, Winter et al. 2022, inter al.)
- Sound symbolism is also relevant in poetry, advertising and branding, among others.

#### Methods

- Connection of Sindarin and Kesh to their associated fictional worlds, and to Tolkien's/Le Guin's conlanging views and goals.
- Comparison of seminal and recent articles on sound symbolism across languages.
- Identification of possible types of sound-symbolism in Kesh:
- o Size sound symbolism (Winter & Perlman 2021 and refs. therein)
- [i] sounds associated with smallness
- [o], [u] sounds associated with large sizes
- o 'R' sounds association with roughness (Winter et al. 2022)
- o 'Light' (sonorant) sounds ('l', 'n', ...) linked to musicality

## Findings

- Partial size sound connection: [i] = <u>smallness</u>, [u] = <u>largeness</u>:
  - o Inye 'small, brief' Búrebúre 'a great many'
- This also applies to animal terms.
- Bit 'fox'
   Bú 'great horned owl'
- o *Míp* 'mouse' *Gunyú* 'wild boar'
- Also observed in how extent and duration are conveyed in verbs:
- o yinye 'small, limited in space/brief, limited in time; for a while'
- yediftu 'small, limited in space/long, time-consuming, or unlimited in time'
- o yeshoud 'large or long in size/brief, limited in time-for a while'
- yehoum 'large or long in size/long, for a long time, endless'
   (Le Guin 2019:687)

# Next steps

- Investigation of additional sound symbolism in Kesh:
  - Sibilant ('s'-like sounds), rhotics ('r'-like sounds)
- Examination of possible sound-meaning connections between the **hinge** and [j], [w] sounds.
  - o Central yin-yang-like metaphor in Always Coming Home.
  - Two-armed spiral circling out from a single center (Fig. 3)
  - [j], [w] are approximants, straddling the border between consonants and vowels in languages.
  - They appear to be over-represented in Kesh hinge-related words.
- Examination of musicality in both Kesh and Sindarin.
